

Message from the Pastor

"The Lord is my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear?

The Lord is the stronghold of my life; of whom shall I be afraid?"

Psalm 27: 1-2

Our Lenten Book Study this year, 24 Hours that Changed the World by Adam Hamilton has really brought a lot of contemplation and insight into Christ's last hours for me. It brought to life the fears of Christ, the experiences of Christ, and the scriptures that likely brought him comfort in his last hours. Those scriptures, being the Psalms, have been opened to me in a new way and they make more sense now in the light of my life now that I know how Christ may have used them in his. I hope that you have found the same insights.

Seeing God in our struggles, in our battles, in the troublesome times of our lives is really one of the hardest things to do. It is easy to fall into the depressing self pity cycle that seems to spiral us further and further away from feeling God's presence. All humanity experiences this. A study done by Psychologists, S. Davidai and T. Gilovich, called *The Headwind/Tailwind Asymmetry Study*, is all about how we are programmed to see the our troubles, anxieties, fears, and struggles as being worse than anybody else's and yet forget the many blessings, and reasons for thanksgiving in all of our lives. Yet Christ was able to rise above this very human response to adversity and to keep his mind focused on God and God's presence. And he did so by turning back to the scriptures, the Psalms which are meant to be reminders to us that no matter how bad things might feel, how frustrated we might become, that God is still there. We should not fear the experiences of humanity for God will be our champion.

If Jesus could do this, affording him the courage to face the torture, humiliation, and pain of the cross, then we could certainly do this in our life experiences. This passage from Psalms reminds us that God loves us even when we struggle to feel his presence. God loves us even when the world looks as if it is falling apart. God loves and there is nothing and no one we need to live in fear of. So as we approach the cross and resurrection with our holiday services on Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday's Tenebrae Service, and finally ending up on Easter Sunday, let us remember to focus on what we are thankful for in our personal lives, in our community lives, and in our societal lives. For we have been blessed, we are not alone, and God is there. Do you see God at work today?




Boards and Committee Reports




Thank you to everyone who has signed up to provide a basket of food and gift cards for families of Covenant to Care.
