Message from the Pastor

"Moses led his flock beyond the wilderness, and came to Horeb, the mountain of God. There the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a flame out of a bush; he looked, and the bush was blazing, yet it was not consumed...Then God said, 'Come no closer! Remove the sandals from your feet, for the place on which you are standing is holy ground.'" - Exodus 3:1b-2, 5

Do you trust that God can do the unthinkable in your lives, and in our community? He's done it before. Our scriptures from Exodus point to it though we may no longer see it because we have lost the meaning of the Hebrew word. Horeb means barren, desolate, and in general completely uninviting. Moses was shepherding his flock in a desolate area which meant that there wasn't much there. There were small scruff shrubs, nothing in the way of grass, and most certainly nothing in the way of water and thus society. It was a dead looking area.

But Moses had inadvertently stumbled upon something unique in the desert wastelands. He stumbled upon the dwelling place of God. And because of this encounter this mountain would turn from a desolate wasteland to a holy place of pilgrimage for generations to come. This was where people would journey to interact with God. God turned that place into something remarkable. God also took a lowly shepherd, who was a fugitive from Egypt, a murder, and a man with a significant speech impediment and in that moment changed his life forever. He went from being an average person to being the salvation of his people and the voice of God to those in need.

So what does this say about us and our communities? This says that God can and does use all of us no matter how unqualified we may feel, no matter how ordinary our lives, or how unremarkable we may feel and in his time he will use us for great things, he will bring life to others through our works, just as he brought life to the lifeless Mount Horeb through his interaction with Moses. So don't be discouraged, don't lose faith, search for God and allow him to do the remarkable in the ordinary.

BOARD OF DEACONS

Rev. Amanda and Nathalie attended The United Church of Christ Annual Conference Meeting (June 16 & 17 in Hartford) at which the major topic was a proposed tri-state merger unifying Massachusetts, Connecticut, and Rhode Island Conferences into one entity. This meeting spoke to whether the representative from each Conference should continue to lay out a plan for unification. Voters from the three Conferences gave the go ahead to the representatives to construct a format which will be again discussed and accepted, or not, at the 2018 annual Conference meeting. At the Deacons July 9th meeting, Rev. Amanda announced that a Memorial Service remembering Alan Schutts will take place on October 7 at 11:00 a.m.

Also, during the 9 July meeting, Leon March suggested a review program blending two closely related elements: where we now stand with our Turnaround Church progress and a review of our church Covenant. Tentatively, this event is planned for sometime in October.

Another Bible Study session, led by Rev. Amanda, will begin on September 13th and will end November 8th. All dates except one are Wednesdays. The exception arises from a workshop and training session our Pastor will attend on October 25. Entitled *Weird Church*, the event addresses how individual congregations might adapt to current changes in Christianity.

Rev. Amanda will have been on vacation and have returned (July 24 through July 30th) by the time you receive this epistle. We hope she had an enjoyable and restful time. She, too, was missed. Filling in for her on July 30th was one of our favorite supply persons-Mr. Doug Halley.

For planning consistency, the Deacons have decided to schedule their meetings on the first Sunday of each month at or near 11:30 AM, in the Bishop Room. All minutes are available, in the office, for your perusal at will.


