Message from the Pastor

"Love anything, and your heart will certainly be wrung and possibly broken. If you want to make sure of keeping it intact, you must give your heart to no one, not even to an animal. Wrap it carefully round with hobbies and little luxuries; avoid all entanglements; lock it up safe in the casket or coffin of your selfishness. But in that casket – safe, dark, motionless, airless – it will change. It will not be broken; it will become unbreakable impenetrable, irredeemable".

Lately, we have really looked at God's love. I have focused a number of sermons on it because it is essential to being Christian and it is something that all too often gets lost in society and the world. Jesus boiled down all of the laws to two laws, that if appropriately honored and lived, will make everything else fall into place. Jesus said that we should love the Lord our God with all of our hearts and souls and to love our neighbors as ourselves. Love was the central focus of his ministry to a world in need. The Messiah came to this world not as a political figure to raise a military to fight a war. The Messiah came to remind the world that God only asks that we love.

As C.S. Lewis noted, this is not an easy command to live into. To love someone or something else, we need to take on the risk that we will experience pain. When we truly love, pain is inevitable. But it is precisely because of that pain that we have compassion for others, that we want to reach out and to do what we can to lessen some of the pain that is in this world. I pick November to speak about this because it is in November and December that most people think about those who are in need. This is when most people reach out to those in need lovingly offering gifts and services. But I would challenge each person to think about living this more than just around the holidays when we are reminded about love, family, and giving. I would urge you to think about joining in the efforts of God's love throughout the year. Volunteer to read to children, volunteer with the elderly, volunteer to help those who are struggling financially. Take a moment to really think about our world, our towns, our communities, and you will see that everyone could use a little more care in their lives.



Scepter and crown
