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Message from the Pastor

Change is perhaps one of the most frustrating parts of life for everyone. Yet everything in life changes, it is a reminder that God continues to create anew in our world. In small churches, change and transition can be full of angst, doubt, and questions. If there were ever a time to place our trust in God it would be now. All over America mainline Christian churches are feeling pains of these changes and this unique moment of transition in religion. In a conversation, I was in 7 years ago, shortly after I started my ministry here, I was told that we (meaning the entirety of Christianity) were embarking on something new. He believed that we were embarking on a new Great Awakening. And as the years have gone by, this notion has not been too far from my mind.

It intrigues me yet still sparks a little fear as well. What will those changes be? What will they look like? Will we (Christianity as a whole) respond to the need or will people be left behind? As I prepare for a training in Simsbury this month, I have been researching and reading about just this and how other churches throughout the United States have already begun to speak to these changes. They do so by courageously facing these transitions and listening to the community around them, opening their doors and hearts to anyone who searches, and they are constantly trying new things. As we move forward into a new era of Christianity, I believe that there will be less distinction between the denominations and more unity; large groups will become small groups as people are seeking a more intimate relationship with their faith and faith communities. In response to this, TAC, the deacons, and I have been thinking about the direction of our own turnaround process. We will be having an informal gathering on October 15th during coffee hour to talk about what we have done to date and what and where we need to go moving forward. In preparation for this, I urge each of you to talk to your neighbors, your friends, and your coworkers and find out what they feel is lacking in Easton as a town and perhaps Fairfield County. We can then use this information to make our church and our programs more useful in ministering to the town and inviting to people to participate and join in on activities and worship. I hope that you will plan to attend that day, as all ideas and suggestions will really help focus us moving forward into the next year's worth of work. We can each be instrumental in shaping the future of Christianity and our church. We are being offered a unique opportunity to launch ourselves into a period of deeper spiritual growth.



Stone Tablets

The tablets of stone symbolize God's giving of the Law to Israel through Moses on Mount Sinai (Horeb). They're often shown with Roman numerals I through III on the left tablet and IV through X on the right. This represents the Ten Commandments — with the first three focusing on God and the final seven focusing on other people. The image of the stone tablets also may represent the entire Old Testament.
